Exciting Progress on Sixty Forward Center

Construction is underway at 205 S. Walnut Avenue in downtown Ames. Our former facility is being replaced by a modern facility called the Sixty Forward Center, and it is set to open in early 2024.

The Sixty Forward Center will seamlessly support those 60+ with the resources needed to live physically active, socially vibrant, and healthy, supported lives. It will have state-of-the-art cardio and strength equipment, a bright and airy atrium for gathering, Duckpin Bowling, several multipurpose rooms that will be used for fitness and wellness classes, health and nutrition support groups, card playing and bingo, and an Adult Day Center.

The Sixty Forward Center will also include a bistro that will be a relaxing and fun place to gather with friend for a beverage and wonderful food. The Sixty Forward Center will also serve as the headquarters for Heartland of Story County.

Additionally, this Sixty Forward partnership between the City of Ames, Heartland of Story County, and Mary Greeley Medical Center will leverage the partners' facilities throughout Ames to offer a broad network of accessible and supportive activities, services, and events for those 60+. Examples include water walking at Furman Aquatic Center, leagues at Homewood Golf Course and Pickleball at various locations throughout the Ames Park system.

"Collaboration represents a cornerstone of our organizational model, so partnering to promote better aging supports our mission as a healthcare organization," said Mary Greeley Medical Center President and CEO Brian Dieter. "Making it easier to access programs and services that improve participants' overall health delivers a big win for everyone."

Ames City Manager Steve Schainker said, "This model turns traditional thinking around into what best serves the needs of our residents. We are focusing on how to provide the appropriate attention to a growing segment of our population to ensure they remain vibrant, healthy, and independent members of our community."

"The collaborative approach to our Sixty Forward Center is an example of how representatives of Story County have come together to support a key segment of the population," said Pam White, Heartland of Story County Board of Directors President-Elect. "Simplifying access to programs and essential services will enhance the health and well-being of participants and their families. We are proud to be part of this unique new gathering place and programmatic model."



Adult Day Center - Care When Families Need It

During construction, the Adult Day Center is being held at Green Hills Community located at 2205 Green Hills Drive in Ames. We reached out to a few of the participants' caregivers to hear what they had to say about how this service provides support for their loved ones.

"The Adult Day Center has offered Dad the opportunity to meet and socialize with new people.

Dad plays cards, balloon volleyball, skee ball, horseshoes, and cornhole. He participates in daily exercises which has helped keep him active. Dad especially enjoys the monthly pet visits from dogs Hunter and Sadie. The ADC staff always celebrate birthdays and anniversaries.

My sister and I still worked when he first started at ADC, and it was great to know he was interacting with others and getting a good noon meal. When we see him in the evenings and ask how his day was, Dad always tells us he had a really good day."
